EDITORIAL POLICY

Nanotechnology Perceptions is published to provide a stimulating forum for the exchange of ideas and information concerning nanotechnology (including bionanotechnology and nanomedicine) and ultraprecision engineering. Each issue will contain essays on critical issues of the technologies themselves, as well as incisive appraisals of their impact on human life, society and its institutions. Articles are intended for a worldwide readership, and should be of especial interest to leaders in industry, commerce (including bankers and investors), the professions, politics and public administration, and all others who must make decisions based on a sober, impartial assessment of the potential—and risks—of nanotechnology in their areas of work.

Acceptance of a paper will be determined by its quality and interest. Clarity of exposition and broad appeal are important criteria for acceptance. All contributions will be assessed by one or more independent referees, and where necessary an adjudicator.

As well as regular papers, Letters to the Editor and Book Reviews are also published. Letters typically deal with matters arising from essays published in a previous issue, or with any topical issue in nanotechnology requiring brief and incisive comment.

SUBMISSIONS

Manuscripts submitted for publication should be sent to the Editor-in-Chief, c/o Collegium Basilea, Hochstrasse 51, CH-4053 Basel, Switzerland. Electronic submissions (preferably Tex, Word or PDF files with figures separately as JPEG or TIFF files, saved at a resolution of 600 dpi, CMYK colour) should be sent to cb@unibas.ch, unless otherwise agreed with a member of the Editorial Board.

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MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

A general impression of the required style can be obtained by consulting any recent issue.

It is expected that most papers will be published in English; however papers in French, German and Italian are also acceptable (in which case a summary in English should be provided).

References to other published work should be restricted to the most essential and important articles. References should be treated as footnotes. Technical terms should be explained in footnotes. They should be numbered in sequence, the numbers superscripted and placed after any punctuation marks. All footnotes will be placed at the foot of the page on which they are referred to.

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
